

Yes, I felt that there were so many other good dancers there that I didn't stand a chance.


 When did you do your auditions and do you have to wait a long time until they called you to join the Show?

• When did you start practising the leading part and who taught you to dance the Lord? How long did it take, to learn the leading part?

By the time I did good guy I knew all the steps already from watching it so much. But when I was going for it, I got help from all the Lords I was working with at the time and took different styles from them all.

What was the hardest part to learn as a lead dancer?



The hardest thing to learn was to overcome nerves before going on stage and to learn to use the nerves instead of being overwhelmed by them.

When and where did you first stepped on stage as Lord?

In Las Vegas about 3 years ago.

You don't remember much it's all kind of a blur, but I remember the excitement.

Have you ever thought of doing the Bad Guy in the Show?

Used to do it for years.

Through the years with LotD ...

Please describe your course of day while touring!

Travel all day, I get food when I get to the hotel, maybe take a run or work out before I have to go in. When I get in we rehearse until show time. Then I do the show, go home, get some food and go to bed.

• Do you like travelling to all those places around the world or is it hard work?

It's both. I like doing it but it's really hard.

• How much do you have to practice while touring?

A few hours a day.

 What is you favourite dance in LotD and in FoF (in Hard-/Softshoes) as a Lead Dancer and as a chorus dancer?

I like Warlords the best as I think it has some fantastic rhythms.



How do you prepare for a show?

Lots and lots of stretching and warming up. You also must make sure you eat right during the day.

Are you nervous before going on stage?

Always... You need a little bit of nerves.

Have you ever been with another Troupe? If so - when was it?

I was with troupe 3 for six years before coming to troupe 1.

Is there a special diet, you have to follow?

I don't have a specific diet, but I do eat as healthy as I can. I don't eat any junk and I don't drink or smoke.

How do you get so much energy for a show?

I train really, really hard.

Costumes & other equipment...

No, because we all work so hard.

How long does it take to get ready before the show?

A few hours.

My Warlords costume. Because it stands out more than the rest of them.
